Public theology in the city is an art form that brings the separate elements of diversity together in a way that images the kingdom of God on earth. Public theology, in contrast with private or individual theology, is a collaborative process best learned in the context of urban diversity where public concerns or issues are found. Together, in partnership with an urban church, the class will learn the basics of the art of doing public theology that leads to redemptive action.

Completion of Introdcution to Theology is recommended but not required.

This course will equip students to formulate their own conceptualizations of evangelism through critically examining how various theologies and biblical teachings inform evangelism.

Priority for most online courses will be given to new and distance students as well as current students who have only taken online courses. Once registration begins, students who meet the criteria for priority registration may contact the Registrar, Vince McGlothin-Eller (vince.mcglothin-eller@garrett.edu), to register. Online courses will open to all students beginning one month before registration closes.

This course is designed to provide students with an opportunity to become knowledgeable about the origins of the Wesleyan tradition and its expressions in The United Methodist Church. It explores the roots of the movement in the Anglican Church and the Wesleyan Revival of the 18th century, and the history of the institutional and theological development of American Methodist/Evangelical United Brethren tradition through the beginning of the 21st century.

This course is designed to make the student familiar with the theology of John Wesley by becoming familiar with his sermons, a doctrinal standard in the United Methodist Church. This will become a starting point for understanding Methodist theology in general, which is characterized by a theological method that seeks to contextualize the Christian faith in a connectional structure of the church.

This course is designed to provide students with the opportunity to fulfill the learning goals described by the General Board of Higher Education and Ministry of The United Methodist Church for fulfillment of the Polity requirement. We will focus on the broader ecology of the ecclesiological forms, governance configurations, membership and orders as they are expressions of the United Methodist expression of Christian mission. The student's use and growing familiarity with the Book of Discipline (2012 edition) and Book of Resolutions is an essential requirement and expectation of the course.

An overview of critical texts in ritual studies. Prepares students in liturgical studies, pastoral theology, and religious education for qualifying exams, and for dissertation research.

This course will delve more deeply into biblical perspectives on gender and sexuality, the Christian traditions that have developed from those biblical texts, and their relationship to the current HIV/AIDS crisis. Students will then be challenged to ask whether these Christian traditions need to be modified to better respond to the pandemic and to offer creative solutions situated within different bilical and Christian traditions, if warranted.

Prereg: 11-500 & 12-500

Introduction to the 27 New Testament documents in the light of various historical-critical methodologies as well as of other more recent theories of interpretation.

Exploration of the role of the Bible in Christian education and faith development. Attention to approaches to teaching the Bible.

Educational approaches for social justice and mission. Educational and ministerial designs that inform about social issues and involve persons and congregations in mission through constituency building and strategic planning and action.

Study of the role of the pastor and church leaders in discipling the congregation and motivating and training the laity in faith-sharing outreach ministries.

Students will be on their own to book travel to and from Rome, so the cost will not include air fare.

The course officially ends after dinner on June 6th, so most students will
be departing Rome and returning on June 7th

The cost is \$3,000 per person (double occupancy). This does not include air fare or credit tuition, but it includes breakfast every day, some group meals, and everything else.

The first deposit of \$1,000 will be due Dec. 15th, with installments of \$1,000 due on Jan 15th and Feb 15th
