Course Description

Three foundational questions guide this exploration of the human development: “Who am I?” “Who am I in relationship to others?” or “Who am I as a result of relationships to others?” and “Who am I in relationship to God?” In this course, Students will explore the theological concept of the Imago Dei, human and faith development theories, and the intersections of race, gender, class, and sexuality in the midst of contemporary North American cultural and social realities. The course is designed to help students deepen their understanding of their own social identities in the context of their spiritual and vocational development. The overall goal of this course is to cultivate students’ self-awareness towards an embodied understanding of self, others, God, and the social structures and ideologies that lead to domination and oppression with a keen awareness of how their own social locations, power, and privilege effect their vocational contexts as pastors, ministers, pastoral counselors, educators, and community leaders.

Options for obtaining required books for classes (besides buying them new)

1. Library Reserves – 2-hour in-library use, can be checked out overnight within two hours of the library closing time. Due when the library opens the next day.
2. Scan the section of the book on Reserves and read on your computer or download onto your device, or photocopy the selection to have a printed copy.
3. Check the eBook collections on the library website for an eBook copy. See below ways to find them from the library website.
4. Get a library card at your local public library and check out their copy of the book or request a copy of the book via their Interlibrary Loan service.
5. Get an ACTS identification card at the Styberg Library Circulation Desk and take that and your Garrett ID card to one of the ACTS libraries to set up an account and check out your book directly from that library.
6. Go to the library at Loyola and set up an account with them to check out their books (we have a reciprocal arrangement with them)
7. Check Amazon or other online booksellers for used books or rental options
8. Share the cost of purchasing books with others in your class

From the A-Z Database list, change the dropdown from “All databases” to eBooks, and then search in the eBook database that seems likely to have your title.

There are several different collections of eBooks available to you. By starting with USearch, you can search all the collections at once. You won't know which distributor is supplying access to the eBook until you view the item. The largest collections and their platforms are noted in the other tabs as well as information on navigating the loan periods and downloading parameters. You can also start your search directly with one of the eBook collection platforms; just follow the links in the tabs.

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1. Start your search by selecting "NU Libraries" and entering a keyword, title, author, or subject.

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2. Refine your search using the 'Availability' facet. Select 'Full Text Online.' Then, further refine your search results using the 'Format' facet by selecting 'Books'
