Course Description:

In this course, we will focus on the life and experience of the average Christian, including devotional practices and other aspects of popular piety. As context, we will be inquiring into the social, cultural, and economic history of the so-called middle ages, though our focus will be primarily on the western (Latin) Church in Europe. The course covers the late patristic period through the "high middle ages." [Prerequisite: HIST 501 ("History 1")]

Student Learning Outcomes:

As a result of the course, students will gain a broad understanding of the period leading up to the Protestant Reformation, as well as a deeper appreciation for the faith of the average believers who were not in positions of authority. Students will have an opportunity to explore the idea of incorporating medieval practices into their own spiritual lives, and will have the benefit of correcting several popular, but incorrect, myths about the Church and society in the middle ages. Writing assignments will give the students an opportunity to practice research skills.

Course Requirements:

Research paper and one short essay. Participation in all online synchronous discussion sessions. Presentation of research to the class. Grades will be based on the writing assignments and presentations, with participation component.
